

Academic Writing Overview:

a TYPE of writing used specifically in ACADEMIA that uses particular CONVENTIONS that differ from other kinds of writing.

Academic Writing Conventions

Clear, consistent, and formal style

APA

Formal organization and presentation of ideas

Analysis + Evidence

Academic Writing: Analysis

Analyze: "to learn the nature and relationship of the parts of (something) by a close and careful examination" (para. 1)

Fit **yourself** and your **ideas** into the conversation!

Summarize: "to tell (information) again using fewer words" (para. 1)

from the <u>Merriam-Webster</u> <u>Dictionary</u>

Academic Writing: Evidence

Books

- By scholars
- Sometimes published on scholarly presses (Yale UP)

Journals

- Peer-reviewed publications
- Not New York Times, Newsweek, etc.

Websites

- Government websites
- Websites by scholarly or professional organizations



Effective Writing Habits: Note

Read

• Engage with your reading *as* you do it

Sort

Review and organize notes soon

Tools

- Electronic (searchable!): Word docs., online tools or programs, Zotero, Evernote
- Paper: Note book, index cards

Effective Writing Habits: Plan

Outline

Use your notes, compiled by topic, to draft an outline before you begin writing

Tools:

- Assignment Planner
- Outlining a Paper
- Outlining Your Outline blog posts

Timeline

Estimate how much time each section of your outline will take to write.

Make yourself a writing calendar with each component listed.

Effective Writing Habits: Focus

Environment

Goals

Find what works for you:

Busy coffee shop or quiet room at home?

Mix it up:

If you aren't working well, figure out the problem and change it.

Small & achievable:

Write a list to keep track


Reward yourself:

Take a break, get coffee, watch TV

Stay on task:

Keep accountable to your outline and timeline

Effective Writing Habits: Ask

Effective Writing Habits: Revise

REVISING:

reviewing your writing for organization, idea development, use of analysis and evidence, paragraphing, and flow

- Occurs during and after writing
- Used to develop and clarify ideas

- Create a <u>reverse</u>outline
- Use the MEAL plan to analyze paragraphs
- Get <u>feedback</u> from the Writing Center

Effective Writing Habits: Revise

Write

- Keep track of your progress
- Complete your final draft



Wait

 Give yourself a break



Proofread

- Remember past suggestions
- Grammarly



Tip: Try reading your work aloud to yourself

Effective Writing Habits: Reflect

Before Writing

- Have I read everything necessary?
- Do I understand my assignment?
- Have I made an outline?

While Writing

- Am I allowing myself to get distracted?
- Am I following my outline?
- Am I asking for help when needed?

After Writing

- Did I give myself enough time to complete the assignment?
- Did I incorporate revising and proofreading?
- What worked well? What didn't work well?


