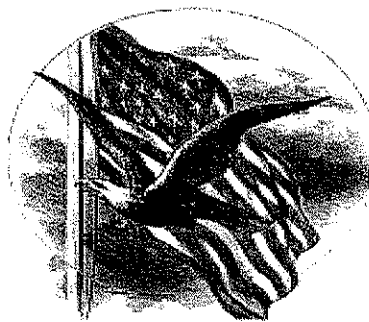
More soldiers credited to Brooklyn were listed as casualties (7) on this day than on any other day of the war. One soldier was wounded and 6 were captured in the 18TH Connecticut. All survived the war.

The date June 15, 1863 ranks 2ND for total casualties (595) (23 killed, 11 wounded, 520 captured, 41 wounded & captured) for a single day for the State of Connecticut. There were 592 casualties at Winchester, VA and 3 casualties at Port Hudson, LA.

The Second Battle of Winchester (June 13-15, 1863) ranks 5TH for total casualties (592) for an engagement for the State of Connecticut. The most intense fighting developed on June 15. Brooklyn had all its casualties on that day.

The Second Battle of Winchester with 7 total casualties for Brooklyn was the highest number of casualties for any single engagement of the war for the town.

Winchester was one of the most contested locations in the Civil War. It changed hands seventy-two times.

SEVEN WERE KILLED

The first Brooklyn soldier killed in combat was Private Daniel I. Tarbox of Company F, 11TH Connecticut. He was killed at the Battle of Antietam, MD on September 17, 1862.

EIGHTEEN WERE WOUNDED

The first Brooklyn soldiers wounded were Corporal James W. Kimball and Private Calvin H. Woodward of Company B, 5TH Connecticut. They were wounded at Cedar Mountain, VA on August 9, 1862 and recovered from their wounds. Five Brooklyn soldiers died from a wound received during the war.

FOURTEEN WERE CAPTURED

One Brooklyn soldier died in captivity at Salisbury, NC.
