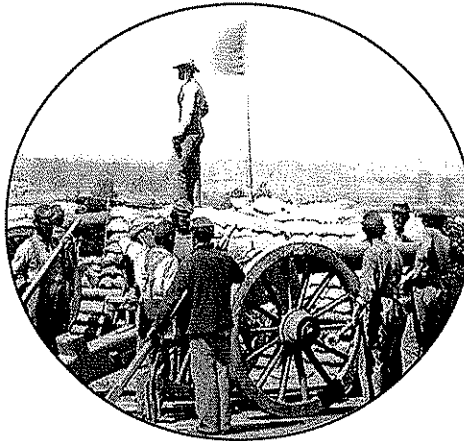

BATTLE OF WINCHESTER

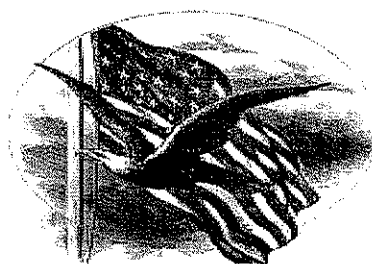
More soldiers credited to Canterbury were listed as casualties (10) on this day than on any other day of the war. Nine soldiers were captured, and 1 was wounded & captured in the 18TH Connecticut. All survived the war.

The date June 15, 1863 ranks 2ND for total casualties (595) (23 killed, 11 wounded, 520 captured, 41 wounded & captured) for a single day for the State of Connecticut. There were 592 casualties at Winchester, VA and 3 casualties at Port Hudson, LA.

The Second Battle of Winchester (June 13-15, 1863) ranks 5TH for total casualties (592) for an engagement for the State of Connecticut. The most intense fighting developed on June 15. Canterbury had all its casualties on that day.

The Second Battle of Winchester with 10 total casualties for Canterbury was the highest number of casualties for any single engagement of the war for the town.

Winchester was one of the most contested locations in the Civil War. It changed hands seventy-two times.

SEVEN WERE KILLED

The first Canterbury soldiers killed were Privates Dwight Carey, Henry H. Neff, and William A. Sweet of Company F, 8TH Connecticut. They were killed at the Battle of Antietam, MD on September 17, 1862.

NINETEEN WERE WOUNDED

The first Canterbury soldiers wounded were Privates George A. Brown and Elijah Green of Company D, 11TH Connecticut. They were wounded at New Bern, NC on March 14, 1862 and both recovered from their wounds. One Canterbury soldier died from a wound received during the war.

SEVENTEEN WERE CAPTURED

One Canterbury soldier died in captivity at Church Flats, SC.
