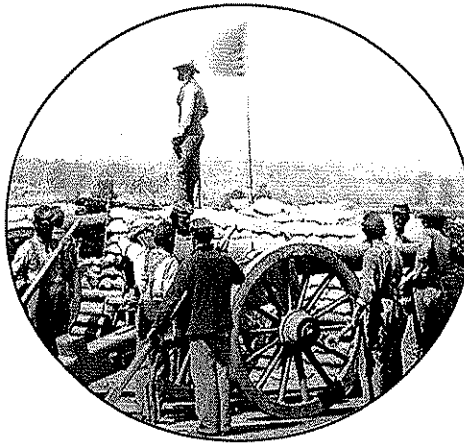

OF THE CIVIL WAR

BATTLE OF WINCHESTER

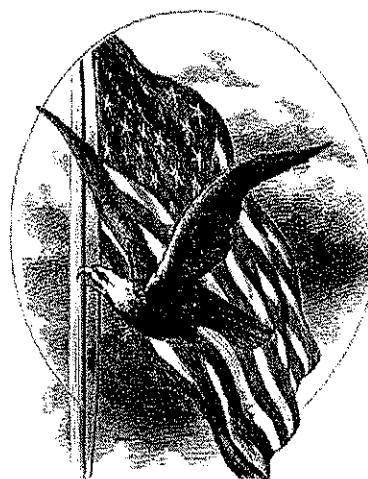
More soldiers credited to Chaplin were listed as casualties (11) on this day than on any other day of the war. Two soldiers were killed, and 9 were captured in the 18TH Connecticut. One of the captured died in prison.

The date June 15, 1863 ranks 2ND for total casualties (595) (23 killed, 11 wounded, 520 captured, 41 wounded & captured) for a single day for the State of Connecticut. There were 592 casualties at Winchester, VA, and 3 casualties at Port Hudson, LA.

The Second Battle of Winchester (June 13-15, 1863) ranks 5TH for total casualties (592) for an engagement for the State of Connecticut. The most intense fighting developed on June 15. Chaplin had all its casualties on that day.

The Second Battle of Winchester with 11 total casualties for Chaplin was the highest number of casualties for any single engagement of the war for the town.

Winchester was one of the most contested locations in the Civil War. It changed hands seventy-two times.

The first Chaplin soldier killed was Private Lorenzo Button of Company F, 7TH Connecticut. He was killed at James Island, SC on June 16, 1862.

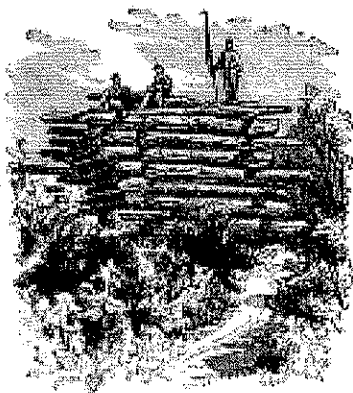

THIRTEEN WERE WOUNDED

The first Chaplin soldiers wounded were Corporal Edward M. Weaver and Privates Waterman Griggs and John M. Griggs of Company D, 11TH Connecticut. They were wounded at the Battle of Antietam, MD on September 17, 1862 and recovered from their wounds. No Chaplin soldier died from a wound received during the war.
