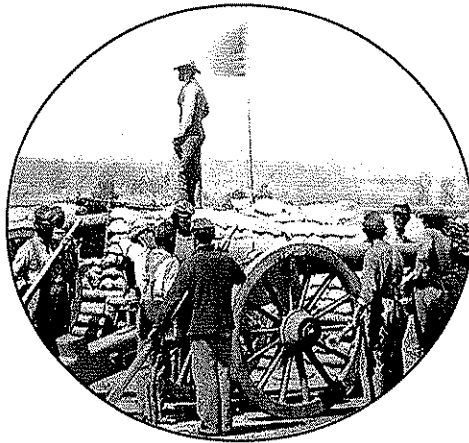

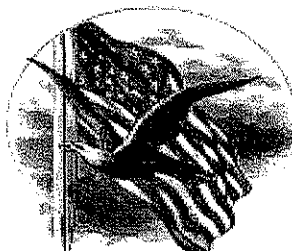
THE POPULATION IN 1860 WAS 3,363 (RANK 30)

OF THE CIVIL WAR

APRIL 20, 1864

PLYMOUTH, NC

THE CONFEDERATE PLAN

ENDED WHEN 2,800 UNION
TROOPS SURRENDERED
THE CITY

More soldiers credited to Glastonbury were listed as casualties (7) on this day than on any other day of the war. Seven soldiers in the 16TH Connecticut were captured. Three of them eventually died in southern prisons.

The date April 20, 1864 ranks 6TH for total casualties (433) (1 killed, 2 missing, 12 wounded & captured, 418 captured) for a single day for the State of Connecticut. All of the casualties were at Plymouth, NC.

The Battle of Plymouth (April 20, 1864) ranks 9TH for total casualties (433) for an engagement for the State of Connecticut. Nearly half of all soldiers captured at Plymouth died in Southern prisons

The Battle of Plymouth with 7 total casualties for Glastonbury was the highest number of casualties for any single engagement of the war for the town

When Confederate General Robert Hoke surrounded and captured the Union garrison at Plymouth, NC the Southern victory was the first in this military arena in quite some time. With aid from the two-gun ironclad *Albemarle* the Confederates were able to take advantage of the lack of suitable Union gunboats.

SEVENTEEN WERE KILLED

The first Glastonbury soldier killed was Private Loren A. House of Company B, 10TH Connecticut. He was killed near New Bern, NC on April 3, 1862.

Five Glastonbury soldiers died in captivity. Three soldiers died at Andersonville Prison, GA and two at Florence, SC.

THIRTY-SEVEN WERE WOUNDED

The first Glastonbury soldier wounded was Private Eleazur Jones of Company D, 7TH Connecticut. He was wounded at Tybee Island, GA on March 1, 1862 and recovered from his wound. Ten Glastonbury soldiers died from a wound received during the war.
