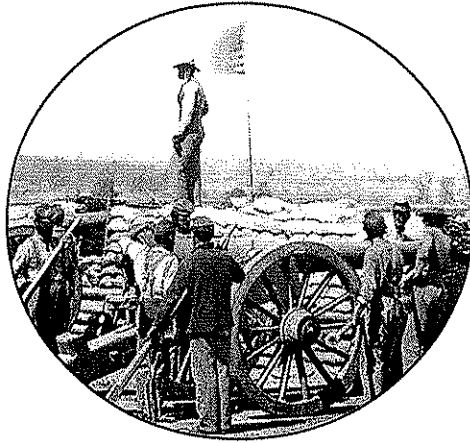

## GREENWICH

THE POPULATION IN 1860 WAS 6,522 (RANK 12)

THE MOST IMPORTANT DAY  
OF THE CIVIL WAR

**JULY 1, 1863**

BATTLE

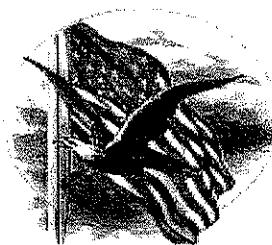
More soldiers credited to Greenwich were listed as casualties (14) on this day than on any other day of the war. One soldier was killed, 5 were wounded, 1 was wounded & captured, and 7 were captured in the 17<sup>TH</sup> Connecticut. The wounded and captured survived the war.

The date July 1, 1863 ranks 16<sup>TH</sup> for total casualties (157) (18 killed, 4 missing, 70 wounded, 57 captured, 8 wounded & captured) for a single day for the State of Connecticut. The Battle of Gettysburg accounted for 143 casualties. The 14 other casualties were in Virginia (6), Louisiana (6), and South Carolina (2).

The Battle of Gettysburg (July 1-3, 1863) ranks 11<sup>TH</sup> for total casualties (360) for an engagement for the State of Connecticut. The most intense fighting developed on July 3. Greenwich had no casualties on that day.

The Battle of Gettysburg with 14 total casualties for Greenwich was the highest number of casualties for any single engagement of the war for the town.

More than 170,000 men fought at the Battle of Gettysburg. Roughly 23,000 Union casualties were recorded and there were about 28,000 Confederate casualties. Gettysburg proved to be the great battle of the war. It ended Lee's 1863 invasion of the North. He was never able to launch a major offensive again.

### NINE WERE KILLED AND TWO WERE MISSING

The first Greenwich soldiers killed were Private James McDonald and Joseph A. Lombard of Company I, 10<sup>TH</sup> Connecticut. Both were killed on March 14, 1862 at New Bern, NC.

### SEVENTY-FOUR WERE WOUNDED

The first Greenwich soldier wounded was Corporal George H. Dayton of Company I, 10<sup>TH</sup> Connecticut. He was wounded at Roanoke Island, NC on February 8, 1862 and recovered from his wound. Nine Greenwich soldiers died from a wound received during the war.
