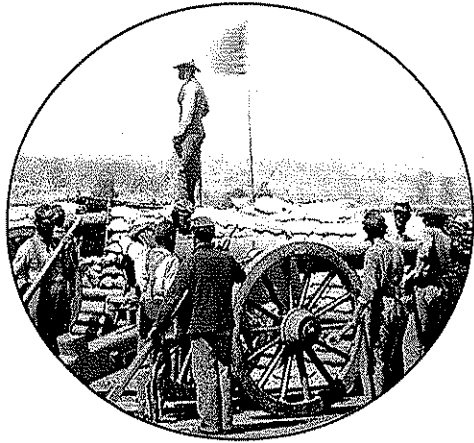

THE MOST IMPORTANT DAY OF THE CIVIL WAR

SEPTEMBER 17, 1862

**SHARPSBURG, MD
(ANTIETAM)**

CONNECTICUT HAD MORE CASUALTIES FOR ONE DAY THAN ON ANY OTHER DAY OF THE WAR

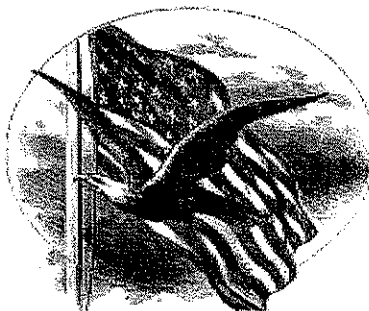
Hampton had more casualties on September 17, 1862 at the Battle Antietam, MD (2), on June 15, 1863 at Winchester, VA (2) and on June 5, 1864 at Piedmont, VA (2) than on any other days of the war. The casualties at the Battle of Antietam were the most serious. Two soldiers were wounded in the 11TH Connecticut. Both survived the war.

The date September 17, 1862 ranks 1ST for total casualties (687) (131 killed, 2 missing, 515 wounded, 21 captured, 18 wounded & captured) for a single day for the State of Connecticut. All of the casualties were at Antietam.

The Battle of Antietam (September 16-17, 1862) ranks 1ST for total casualties (689) for an engagement for the State of Connecticut. The most intense fighting developed on September 17. Hampton had all of its casualties on that day.

The Battle of Antietam with 2 total casualties for Hampton was tied for the highest number of casualties for any single engagement of the war for the town with the battles of Winchester (June 15, 1863), and Piedmont (June 5, 1864).

Roughly 12,400 Union casualties were recorded and perhaps there were 10,300 Confederate casualties. Antietam proved to be one of the turning points of the war. It ended Lee's 1862 invasion of the North.

ONE WAS KILLED

The only Hampton soldier killed was Private Elisha L. Ashley of Company G, 12TH Connecticut. He was killed at Georgia Landing, LA on October 27, 1862.

One Hampton soldier died in captivity at Andersonville Prison, GA.

SIX WERE WOUNDED

The first Hampton soldiers wounded were Corporal Andrew J. Kimball and Private William E. Ford of Company F, 11TH Connecticut. Both were wounded at the Battle of Antietam, MD on September 17, 1862 and both recovered from their wounds. No Hampton soldiers died from a wound received during the war.
