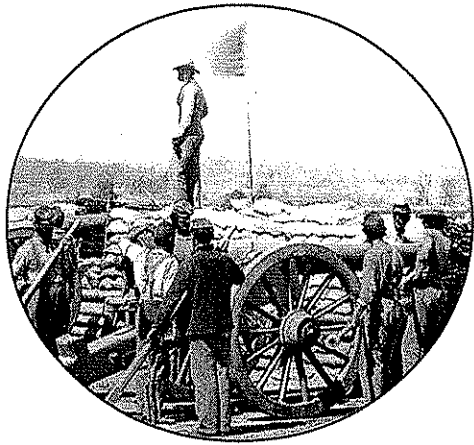

CAPTURE RICHMOND

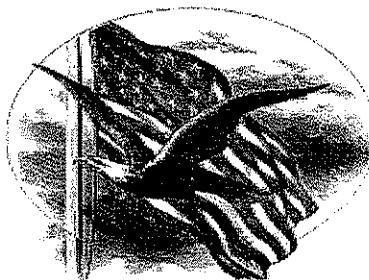
More soldiers credited to Hebron were listed as casualties (2) on this day than on any other day of the war. Two soldiers were wounded in the 1ST Connecticut Light Battery. Both soldiers survived the war.

The date May 14, 1864 ranks 31ST for total casualties (85) (13 killed, 70 wounded, 2 captured) for a single day for the State of Connecticut. All of the casualties were in Virginia: Drewry's Bluff (69), Proctor's Creek (23), Bermuda Hundred (2), Petersburg (2), Chester Station (1), and Spottsylvania (1).

The Engagement at Proctor's Creek (May 3-20, 1864) ranks 68TH for total casualties (23) for an engagement for the State of Connecticut.

The Engagement at Proctor's Creek with 2 total casualties for Hebron was the highest number of casualties for any single engagement of the war for the town.

In the Spring of 1864, the Union Army began a major offensive to capture Richmond and Petersburg, VA. Confederate General Pierre G.T. Beauregard, who commanded the forces at Petersburg, was able to deflect Union General Benjamin Butler's advances.

ONE WAS KILLED

The only Hebron soldier killed was Captain Joseph Backus of Company K, 1ST Connecticut Cavalry. He was killed at Old Church Tavern, VA on June 10, 1864.

SIX WERE WOUNDED

The first Hebron soldier wounded was Private John K. Lamphere of Company C, 24TH Connecticut. He was wounded at Port Hudson, LA on June 14, 1863 and recovered from his wound. One Hebron soldier died from a wound received during the war.

FIVE WERE CAPTURED

Three Hebron soldiers died in captivity. Two died at Salisbury NC and one at Petersburg, VA.
