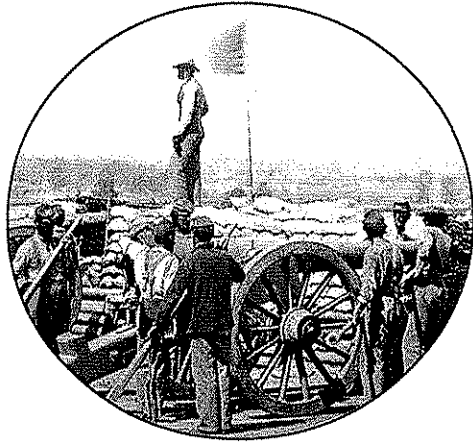

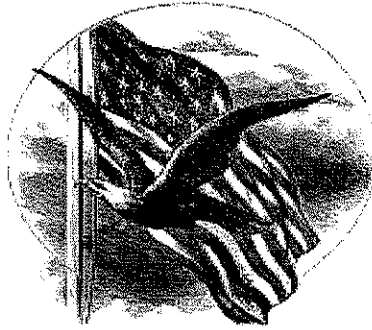
THE POPULATION IN 1860 WAS 4,926 (RANK 17)

More soldiers credited to Killingly were listed as casualties (86) on this day than on any other day of the war. Five soldiers were killed, 76 captured, and 5 wounded & captured in the 18<sup>TH</sup> Connecticut. One of the captured soldiers died in prison.

The date June 15, 1863 ranks 2<sup>ND</sup> for total casualties (595) (23 killed, 11 wounded, 520 captured, 41 wounded & captured) for a single day for the State of Connecticut. There were 592 casualties at Winchester, VA and 3 casualties at Port Hudson, LA.

The Second Battle of Winchester (June 13-15, 1863) ranks 5<sup>TH</sup> for total casualties (592) for an engagement for the State of Connecticut. The most intense fighting developed on June 15. Killingly had all its casualties on that day.

The Second Battle of Winchester with 86 total casualties for Killingly was the highest number of casualties for any single engagement of the war for the town.

Winchester was one of the most contested locations in the Civil War. It changed hands seventy-two times.

**SEVENTEEN WERE KILLED AND TWO WERE MISSING**

The first Killingly soldiers killed were Privates James Daggett, Thomas Simmons, Stephen H. Oatley, Robert Sharkey and Musician Daniel G. Bennett of the 18<sup>th</sup> Connecticut. They were killed at Winchester, VA on June 15, 1863.

**ONE HUNDRED-ONE WERE CAPTURED**

Seven Killingly soldiers died in captivity. Four died at Andersonville Prison, GA, two at Libby Prison, Richmond, VA and one at Belle Island Prison, VA.

**FIFTY-NINE WERE WOUNDED**

The first Killingly soldier wounded was Private James A. Howard of Company K, 7<sup>th</sup> Connecticut. He was wounded at Tybee Island, GA on April 1, 1862 and recovered from his wound. Seven Killingly soldiers died from a wound received during the war.
