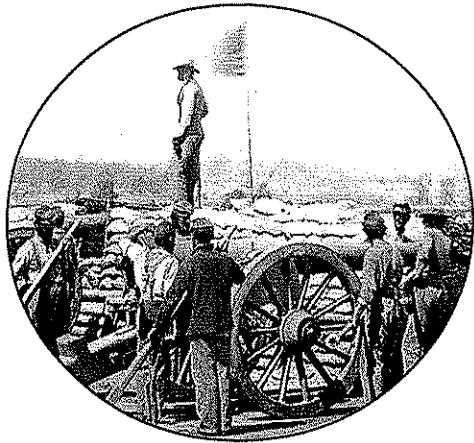

LAST GREAT VICTORY

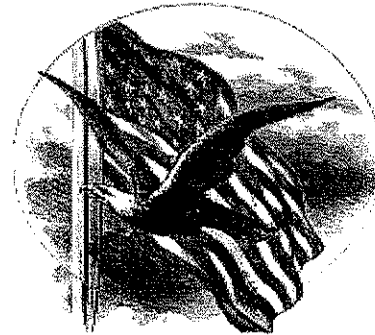
More soldiers credited to Norfolk were listed as casualties (7) on this day than on any other day of the war. Two soldiers were missing (killed) and 5 were wounded in the 2ND Connecticut Heavy Artillery. Two of the wounded died.

The date June 1, 1864 ranks 8TH for total casualties (374) (89 killed, 10 missing, 246 wounded, 23 captured, 6 wounded & captured) for a single day for the State of Connecticut. There were 324 casualties at Cold Harbor, 41 casualties at Ashland, and 9 other casualties scattered about Virginia.

The battle and operations around Cold Harbor (May 31-June 12) rank 6TH for total casualties (557) for an engagement for the State of Connecticut. The most intense fighting developed on June 3. Norfolk had 1 killed and 4 wounded.

The Battle of Cold Harbor with 12 total casualties for Norfolk was the highest number of casualties for any single engagement of the war for the town.

Approximately 117,000 Federal and 60,000 Confederate troops participated in operations from May 28 to June 3. Roughly 13,000 Union casualties were recorded and perhaps there were 5,000 Confederate casualties.

SEVEN WERE KILLED AND TWO WERE MISSING

The first Norfolk soldiers killed were Corporal Theodore S. Bates and Privates Theodore Parreit and Benjamin J. Beach of Company E, 11TH Connecticut. They were killed at The Battle of Antietam, MD on September 17, 1862.

Two Norfolk soldiers died in captivity. One died at Libby Prison Richmond, VA and one died at Salisbury, NC.

THIRTY WERE WOUNDED

The first Norfolk soldiers wounded were Corporal Daniel A. Keyes and Private John D. Barden of the 5TH Connecticut. They were wounded at Cedar Mountain, VA on August 9, 1862 and both recovered from their wounds. Eight Norfolk soldiers died from a wound received during the war.
