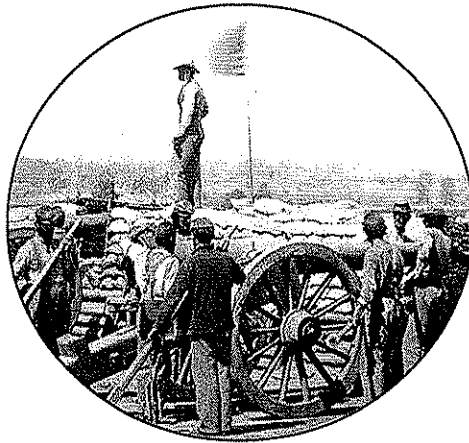

BATTLE

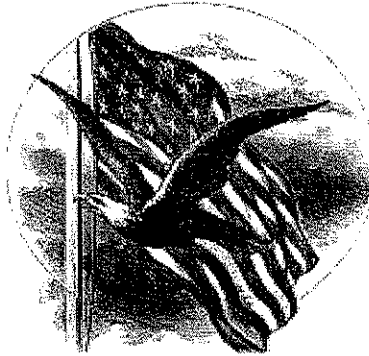
More soldiers credited to North Haven were listed as casualties (4) on this day than on any other day of the war. Four soldiers in the 27TH Connecticut were captured. All survived the war.

The date May 3, 1863 ranks 3RD for total casualties (577) (36 killed, 1 missing, 138 wounded, 372 captured, 29 wounded & captured) for a single day for the State of Connecticut. The most casualties were at Chancellorsville, VA (556). The other casualties were at Providence Church Road, VA (12), Suffolk, VA (6), Port Hudson, LA (2) and Fredericksburg, VA (1).

The Battle of Chancellorsville (May 1-3, 1863) ranks 2ND for total casualties (677) for an engagement for the State of Connecticut. The most intense fighting developed on May 3. North Haven had no other casualties in the battle other than on May 3.

The Battle of Chancellorsville with 4 total casualties for North Haven was the highest number of casualties for any single engagement of the war for the town.

The Battle of Chancellorsville was an enormous defeat for the more than 70,000 Union soldiers who had moved against the flank and rear of 40,000 Confederate soldiers. Unfortunately, the Union Army had pulled back and had gone on the defensive around Chancellorsville. The Confederate victory was tainted however, by the loss of Confederate Major General "Stonewall" Jackson.

SEVEN WERE KILLED

The first North Haven soldier killed was Corporal Joseph O. Blair of Company C, 5TH Connecticut. He was killed on August 9, 1862 at Cedar Mountain, VA.

EIGHT WERE WOUNDED

The first North Haven soldier wounded was Private Theodore Bradley of Company H, 7TH Connecticut. He was wounded at James Island, SC on June 16, 1862 and recovered from his wound. One North Haven soldier died from a wound received during the war.
