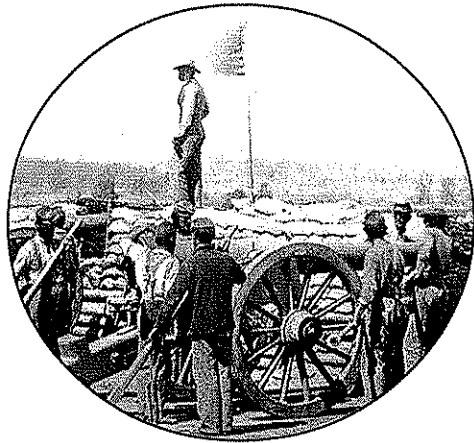

THE MOST IMPORTANT DAY
OF THE CIVIL WAR

APRIL 20, 1864

PLYMOUTH, NC

THE CONFEDERATE PLAN

ENDED WHEN 2,800 UNION
TROOPS SURRENDERED
THE CITY

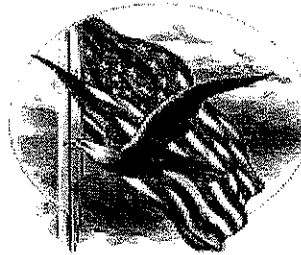
More soldiers credited to Rocky Hill were listed as casualties (9) on this day than on any other day of the war. Nine soldiers in the 16TH Connecticut were captured. Four of them eventually died in prison.

The date April 20, 1864 ranks 6TH for total casualties (433) (1 killed, 2 missing, 12 wounded & captured, 418 captured) for a single day for the State of Connecticut. All of the casualties were at Plymouth, NC.

The Battle of Plymouth (April 20, 1864) ranks 9TH for total casualties (433) for an engagement for the State of Connecticut. Nearly half of all soldiers captured at Plymouth died in Southern prisons

The Battle of Plymouth with 9 total casualties for Rocky Hill was the highest number of casualties for any single engagement of the war for the town.

When Confederate General Robert Hoke surrounded and captured the Union garrison at Plymouth, NC the Southern victory was the first in this military arena in quite some time. With aid from the two-gun ironclad *Albatross* the Confederates were able to take advantage of the lack of suitable Union gunboats.

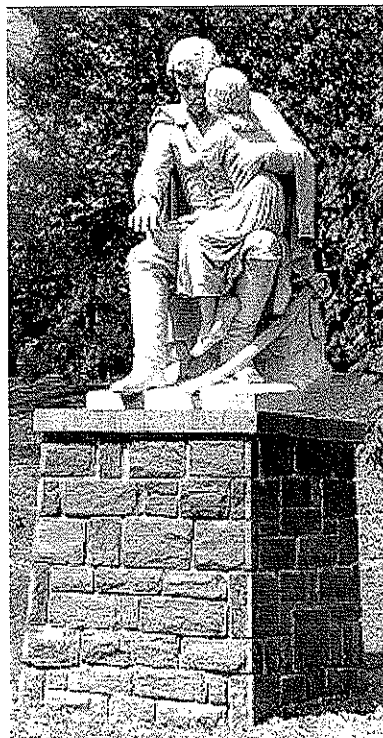
NO ROCKY HILL SOLDIERS WERE KILLED

Four Rocky Hill soldiers died in captivity. Two soldiers died at Andersonville Prison, GA, one at Charleston, SC and one at Florence, SC.

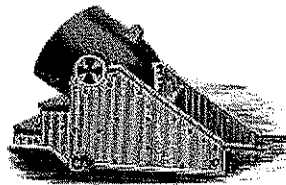

FOURTEEN WERE WOUNDED

The first Rocky Hill soldiers wounded were Corporal Albert S. Hatch, Musician John White, and Privates Charles H. Waterman and Donalds Levaughn of the 8TH and 11TH Connecticut. They were wounded at The Battle of Antietam, MD on September 17, 1862. Private Waterman died from his wound. Two Rocky Hill soldiers died from a wound received during the war.
