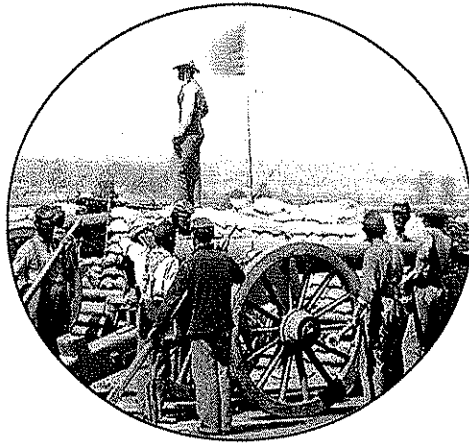

OF THE CIVIL WAR

BATTLE OF WINCHESTER

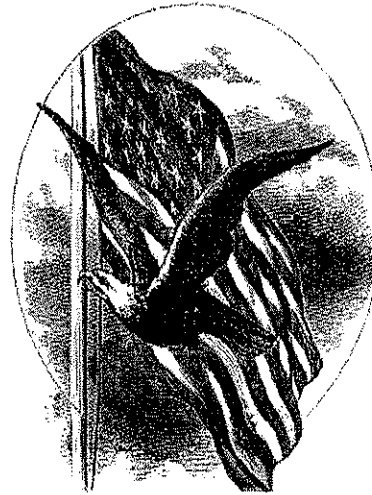
More soldiers credited to Scotland were listed as casualties (4) on this day than on any other day of the war. Four soldiers in the 18TH Connecticut were captured and all survived the war.

The date June 15, 1863 ranks 2ND for total casualties (595) (23 killed, 11 wounded, 520 captured, 41 wounded & captured) for a single day for the State of Connecticut. There were 592 casualties at Winchester, VA and 3 casualties at Port Hudson, LA.

The Second Battle of Winchester (June 13-15, 1863) ranks 5TH for total casualties (592) for an engagement for the State of Connecticut. The most intense fighting developed on June 15. Scotland had all its casualties on that day.

The Second Battle of Winchester with 4 total casualties for Scotland was the highest number of casualties for any single engagement of the war for the town.

Winchester was one of the most contested locations in the Civil War. It changed hands seventy-two times.

ONE WAS KILLED

The only Scotland soldier killed was Private William Burton of the 29TH Connecticut. He was killed at Kell House, VA on October 27, 1864.

**ELEVEN WERE WOUNDED**

The first Scotland soldier wounded was Private Humphrey Sheen of Company D, 11TH Connecticut. He was wounded after the Battle of Antietam, MD on September 20, 1862 and recovered from his wound. One Scotland soldier died from a wound received during the war.
