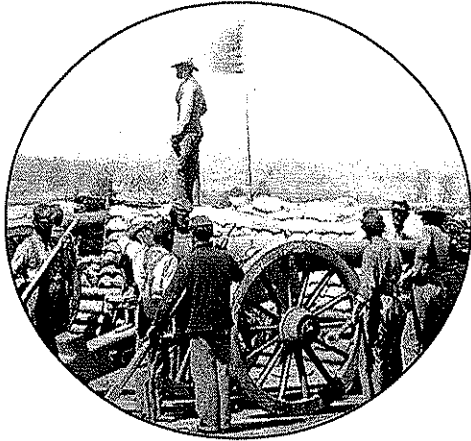

BATTLE OF WINCHESTER

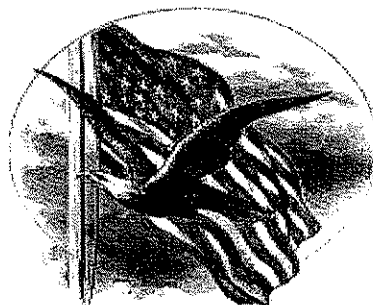
More soldiers credited to Tolland were listed as casualties (10) on this day than on any other day of the war. Two soldiers were killed, and 8 were captured in the 18TH Connecticut. The captured survived the war.

The date June 15, 1863 ranks 2ND for total casualties (595) (23 killed, 11 wounded, 520 captured, 41 wounded & captured) for a single day for the State of Connecticut. There were 592 casualties at Winchester, VA and 3 casualties at Port Hudson, LA.

The Second Battle of Winchester (June 13-15, 1863) ranks 5TH for total casualties (592) for an engagement for the State of Connecticut. The most intense fighting developed on June 15. Tolland had all its casualties on that day.

The Second Battle of Winchester with 10 total casualties for Tolland was the highest number of casualties for any single engagement of the war for the town.

Winchester was one of the most contested locations in the Civil War. It changed hands seventy-two times.

FOUR WERE KILLED

The first Tolland soldiers killed were Privates Charles A. Barber and Alfred E. Tracy of Company H, 18TH Connecticut. They were killed at Winchester, VA on June 15, 1863.

NINE WERE WOUNDED

The first Tolland soldier wounded was Private Thomas Wilkie of Company D, 14TH Connecticut. He was wounded at the Battle of Antietam, MD on September 17, 1862 and died from his wound. Two Tolland soldiers died from a wound received during the war.
