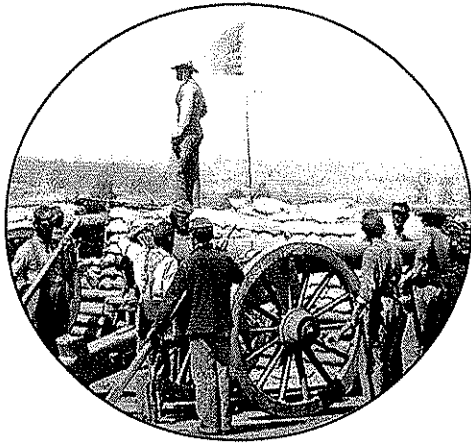

THE MOST IMPORTANT DAY
OF THE CIVIL WAR

OCTOBER 19, 1864

CEDAR CREEK, VA

THE LAST MAJOR BATTLE

VALLEY CAMPAIGN WAS A
UNION TRIUMPH

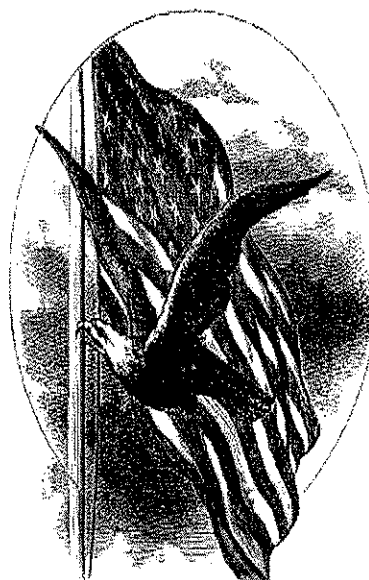
Soldiers credited to Warren had more casualties on September 22, 1864 at Fisher's Hill, VA (2) and on October 19, 1864 at Cedar Creek, VA (2) than on any other days of the war. The casualties at Cedar Creek were the most serious. Two soldiers were wounded in the 2ND Heavy Artillery. Both survived the war.

The date October 19, 1864 ranks 7TH for total casualties (417) (48 killed, 2 missing, 204 wounded, 153 captured, 10 wounded & captured) for a single day for the State of Connecticut. The Battle of Cedar Creek accounted for 415 casualties. The other 2 casualties were in the neighboring towns.

The Battle of Cedar Creek (October 19, 1864) ranks 10TH for total casualties (415) for an engagement for the State of Connecticut.

The Battle of Cedar Creek with 2 total casualties for Warren was tied with Fisher's Hill (September 22, 1864) for the 2ND highest number of casualties for any single engagement of the war. The Siege of Petersburg (June 1864-April 1865) ranks 1ST with 3 total casualties

The news of the Union triumph at Cedar Creek assured a Republican victory in the elections of November 1864 and the prosecution of the war to its end on President Abraham Lincoln's and Lieutenant General Ulysses S. Grant's terms.

ONE WAS KILLED

The only Warren soldier killed was Private Charles Barney of Company I, 2ND Connecticut Heavy Artillery. He was killed at Winchester, VA on September 19, 1864.

No Warren soldiers died in captivity.

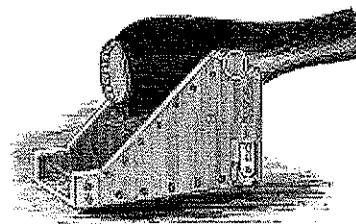

The first Warren soldier wounded was Private Edward F. Brague of Company D, 10TH Connecticut. He was wounded at Roanoke Island, NC on February 8, 1862 and recovered from his wound. One Warren soldier died from a wound received during the war.
