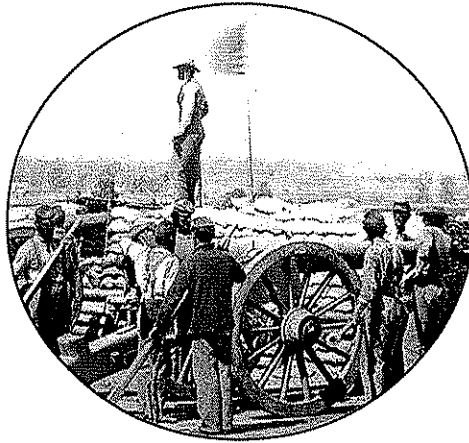

THE MOST IMPORTANT DAY OF THE CIVIL WAR

SEPTEMBER 19, 1864

WINCHESTER, VA

THE BATTLE OF THIRD WINCHESTER (OPEQUON) WAS A UNION VICTORY

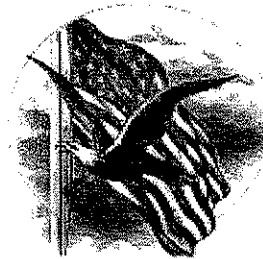
More soldiers credited to Woodbury were listed as casualties (11) on this day than on any other day of the war. Eleven soldiers were wounded in the 2ND Connecticut Heavy Artillery. Three of the wounded died.

The date September 19, 1864 ranks 9TH for total casualties (279) (38 killed, 209 wounded, 32 captured) for a single day for the State of Connecticut. There were 274 casualties at Winchester. The 5 other casualties were in the Petersburg, VA area.

The Battle of Third Winchester (September 19, 1864) ranks 12TH for total casualties (274) for an engagement for the State of Connecticut.

The Battle of Third Winchester with 11 total casualties for Woodbury was the highest number of casualties for any single engagement of the war for the town.

The battle was not an overwhelming victory for the Union Army. As the Union force was approaching Winchester from the east they became bogged down and the attacks were uncoordinated. The Union army sustained heavier casualties but the Confederates moved to a stronger position at Fisher's Hill south of Strasburg. The total casualties were about 7,500.

THREE WERE KILLED AND TWO WERE MISSING

The first Woodbury soldier killed was Private John E. Tuttle of Company E, 8TH Connecticut. He was killed at the Battle of Antietam, MD on September 17, 1862.

THIRTY-EIGHT WERE WOUNDED

The first Woodbury soldiers wounded were Privates Wesley Bunnell, Thomas C. Galpin, and Frank J. Percy of the 8TH and 14TH Connecticut. They were wounded at the Battle of Antietam, MD on September 17, 1862 and survived their wounds. Private Percy was later reported missing and presumed dead at Fredericksburg, VA on December 13, 1862. Eight Woodbury soldiers died from a wound received during the war.
